

FAREWELL TO A REMARKABLE REGIMENT By Gill Robinson Photos by Dominic KIng and Charlie Booker

Disbandment Service Honours Proud History







A poignant service of farewell to mark the disbandment of 7th Signal Regiment, and to celebrate 53 years of exceptional service, has been held at the Regiment's home in Javelin Barracks, within the Rhine Garrison.

The understandably emotional service, presided over by Father Danny Hernandez, was attended by current and past members of the Regiment and their families, plus dignitaries from local host-nation towns. The Regiment's current Commanding Officer Lt Col Al Long, and previous Commanding Officers were present.

During the service, the feelings of those in the congregation were accurately expressed during an address that was delivered by the Reverend WG Ashton, QHC CF, Assistant Chaplain General 1st Armoured Division. Speaking of the understandable loss felt by the Regiment's closure he told the congregation, "Whatever happens to the name of 7th Signal Regiment in the future, you will still be around as a member of what this proud unit has been, of what it has done, and your bonds of friendship will remain."

Reverend Ashton continued speaking of the future of the Royal Signals Corp, "The disbandment of 7th Signal Regiment is the end of this particular chapter in the history of the Royal Corps of Signals. However, the Corps goes on, as vital as ever, to the Army and our nation; probably more so in this age of digital information and communication. So that although this chapter is closed you all need to continue, taking with you your professional reputation and the lessons

that you have learned."

Also present was the Mayor of Niederkrüchten, Herr Herbert Winzen, who explained that he enjoyed the service very much. Herr Herbert said that he was impressed with the Andrew Humphrey School pupil's rendition of their own Leavers' Song. Herr Winzen was also saddened about the slow downsizing of the British Forces in the region. Over the years they had become good neighbours and were part of the local community; it would be hard to imagine the town without them.

The moment of disbandment was marked formally during the service by the lowering of the Regiment's flag for the very last time, by Sgt Lee Jolly, who has been a member of Support Squadron for approximately three years and who deployed on Op Eagle in January 2011. "I have been involved with a lot of the drill for parades marking Squadron's returning from Afghanistan, so I wanted to lower the flag today as it is the last time. It was emotional. I have absolutely enjoyed my time at 7th Signal Regiment, there has been a new challenge every day," Sgt Jolly explained.

7th Signal Regiment's unfortunate closure comes as a result of the Government's Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR), published in October 2010. And the disbandment service marks the end-stages of a closure process that started in November 2011 with the closure of 231 Squadron, and will see the Regiment finally close its doors at the end of July this















Speaking after the service Lt Col Al Long, as the final Commanding Officer of 7th Signal Regiment, spoke of his time with the Regiment, "It has been a fantastic Regiment and the sadness of disbandment has been felt by us all, but we are looking forward to the next challenge. It has been very busy throughout my time in command, with operations continuing almost to the end and I am very proud to have been the last CO of this Regiment."

Speaking about the future of Elmpt Station, which is itself scheduled to close under the BORONA Programme by the end of 2016, Lt Col Long continued, "Of course 16th Signal Regiment will continue the strong tradition of the Royal Corps of Signals in Elmpt. Elmpt will definitely remain a fantastic place to be."

Plans are already being made to ensure that the buildings that 7th Signal Regiment continue to withdraw from, leading up to the final closure of 7th Signal Regiment on July 31st 2012, do not go to waste. The space will be taken over by 1 Military Intelligence Battalion, who will move from their current location in the Rheindahlen Military Complex to Javelin Barracks between April and July this year. A historically symbolic figure who attended the service was Brig James Richardson, the new Commander Germany Garrisons.

Brig Richardson's presence closes the circle on 7th Signal Regiment's time at Elmpt Station, because he



was the Regiment's Commanding Officer at the time when it moved from their previous home in Krefeld to Elmpt.

"In the era of massive changes to the Army it is a poignant and reflective moment when any regiment disbands particularly so when you were once the Commanding Officer. I have particular fond memories

of Commanding 7th Signal Regiment, who I moved from Krefeld into Elmpt in 2002, and I am grateful to the current regiment for the style, manner and sensitivity in coordinating the disbandment function. Three of the previous COs, dating back to the 1980s, stayed with me during the ceremonies and concurred their admiration for the way the Mighty 7th era closed," Brig Richardson said.

WELFARE AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT







HIVE originally stood for Help, Information, Volunteer, Exchange. Many people might ask, what is the "HIVE" and what can it do for me?

The Hive is an organization that supports the Chain of Command and tri-service communities through the provision of up to date and relevant information, and has continued to develop over the past 28 years.

The History of HIVE began back in May of 1984 when, through the Adjutant General's Conference, attention was drawn to the need to improve provision of welfare support for army families. The following year, pilot schemes for a "voluntary Bureau" opened at Munster and Hohne in Germany. Military wives donated their time to help new soldiers and families adjust to their new communities. These became known as the original HIVEs.

By May of 1987 and the implementation of Colonel Mike Gaffney's Army Wives Study, it was recommended that the MOD fund future development of such HIVEs as they became known for their tremendous support to their communities. The MOD responded very quickly and in July of that same year, funding was made available for a limited number of new HIVEs in Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

Through continued recognition of the HIVEs' service to its military communities and due to the support of other organisations such as the Federation of Army Wives, UK CAST and SSAFA, the HIVE footprint continued to grow during the 1980's and early 1990's. HIVEs were established throughout the world in locations such as Cyprus, Gibraltar and even Hong Kong. In January of 1997 HIVE launched a new image and a logo based on the HIVE "name" signalling the demise of the "bee".

In October of 2000, HIVEs across the world went online and the growth of the HIVE and its ability to serve was accelerated through the availability and implementation of new information technologies

From its humble beginnings and with much due to the hard work and devotion of hundreds of staff members and volunteers throughout the years, the HIVE has never stopped growing.

The face of the HIVE is a new one and is constantly adapting and challenging itself to keep up with the times. HIVEs today are recognised as highly professional and reliable information centres, providing an invaluable resource to the military communities that they serve.

World wide there are over 100 of these HIVE offices spread across 11 different countries. They are staffed by a professionally trained team of HIVE Information Officers and Volunteers, who do what they do because they love helping people. Headquartered here at Rheindahlen, HIVE Europe alone operates 20 of these information centres in 5 countries. They have adopted their corporate colour of "purple" to represent our tri-service communities.

You can now contact your local HIVE through their website or you can even communicate with them on facebook. Hive Europe has also developed a weekly newsletter that is delivered electronically and provides a direct link to your local HIVE Information Office. Important information such as warnings and stop presses are distributed almost immediately through the network of HIVE offices from an information HUB run by a dedicated and well informed HIVE support team.

Fostering in BFG

Fostering can be challenging; children who come into foster care are usually confused and anxious about being separated from their families. BFSWS makes sure that prospective foster parents are properly trained to help them understand more fully what is expected of them and to equip them to meet the needs of the children placed with them.

In BFG, foster carers are likely to be used on an occasional basis, usually only for a few days or sometimes a few weeks. It is important to have a pool of foster carers throughout BFG who are available and willing to look after a child at short notice, so a child can be placed as near to their home and community as possible.

Fosters carers find their role very rewarding. One carer commented, "we enjoy finding ways to help children cope with loss, anger and how they can make things better for themselves, and being able to offer a safe bed for a night or two". Another carer explained why they had chosen to foster: "We felt that we had the patience to listen to a child and that we were non-judgemental people."





Fostering is an important service in BFG and what's more, this is a wonderful opportunity to help others in the Forces community. The qualities BFSWS is looking for in foster carers are knowledge and experience of child care, flexibility, resourcefulness and a desire to help children and their families in times of crisis. BFSWS offers support, training and planning in the foster placement; they also provide a fostering allowance for the period the child is with the foster carers. BFSWS social workers are always there to help and support the foster carers who undertake this very important role in our community. Our next preparation training is the weekend of 20th - 22nd April 2012 at Church House, Lubbecke (near Herford). We are particularly interested in hearing from members of the Foreign and Commonwealth Community.

British Forces Social Work Service - Western Europe By Cathy Dobson

This contracted social work service (provided by SSAFA FH) is delivered to the military community in Western Europe (British Forces Germany and European Support Group) and provides world wide telephone support 'out of hours' for any safeguarding issues in isolated commands.

BFSWS services are provided in the spirit of the Children Act 1989 and 2004 and in line with best practice in the UK.

The services we provide include services for children and young people, families and people with a disability or other additional need.

There are two Family Support Teams based in 8 locations, covering British Forces Germany area as well as the smaller military communities in other European countries.


In addition to the Family Support Teams, there is a Central

Referral and Joint Response Team. The Central Referral Team is the central point of contact for BFSWS and deals with all the referrals, consultations and questions to the service. The Joint Response Team is a child-protection investigation team consisting of the Royal Military Police and Senior Social Work Practitioners. The Joint Response Team also provides an 'out of hours' service for the emergency protection and safeguarding of children.

There are also Senior Social Work Practitioners, Social Workers with expertise in:

- Adoption
- Fostering
- Additional Needs and Disability.



BFG Coupon Price Shock

Amid ongoing uncertainty in Iran and the weakening of the European economies, there has been a increase in the cost of crude oil over the past few months. This has resulted in price hikes at the pumps for both petrol and diesel. The problem has been exacerbated by the relative weakness of the Euro, which affects consumers as oil products are typically paid for in US\$.

Prices in Europe have risen significantly and despite being free of tax the BFG coupon prices have also been hit hard. This means that the BFG motorist will have to bear the same pain as their civilian counterparts. Careful consideration and effort is used when assessing the monthly coupon selling prices and BFG motorists can rest assure that everything is done in order to obtain the best possible deal. Contrary to popular belief, the non-Public BFG Coupon Account only generates sufficient income to cover the cost of the BFG Coupon and the BFG Vehicle Licensing System. No profit is made.

The article below provides a clear insight into how coupon prices are assessed and how funds are generated to finance the two systems.

BFG Coupon Pricing

The BFG motorist will have observed that fuel coupon prices have increased significantly this month. A brief explanation of why and how the price of BFG fuel coupons is arrived at follows below:

BFG fuel coupons are fixed for a month at a time, unlike the pump prices at local service stations which might fluctuate as much as fifteen times a month. Favourable contract conditions with our suppliers, ARAL, SHELL and ESSO, provide us with this price stability.

Monthly coupon prices are based upon an average of all service station prices within these suppliers' networks. These prices are then reduced by the Mehrwertsteuer (VAT) element, oil taxes and compulsory stockpile fees. A mandatory administrative charge to cover the costs of the coupon scheme is then added and the coupon price is set. This charge is assessed annually by Management Accountant, HQ BFG.

More observant motorists will have noticed that BFG coupon prices seem to be out of sync with commercial prices; this is because cost prices between the 20th and 26th of the previous month are used in setting coupon prices. Consequently, BFG motorists can pay more (or less) than the current commercial market price in any one month. However, overall experience has shown that the BFG motorist is never disadvantaged as short term price variations are always corrected, albeit in retrospect.

150,000 petrol coupons are purchased and used each month. Additionally, another 300,000 coupons remain unredeemed in BFG motorists' possession from one month to the next. This "back-log" of coupons has to be revalued and the new value taken into account when assessing the next month's selling prices

Another situation that may appear puzzling is the apparent disparity between BFG coupon prices and commercial pump prices, particularly regarding diesel prices. This is largely due to the differing tax levels on petrol and diesel; the table below illustrates how a lower tax on a cheaper fuel renders it more expensive in its untaxed form which BFG motorists are entitled to.

	DIESEL	PETROL
Pump Price	€0.90	€1.00
Less Mineral Oil Tax	€0.47	€0.65
Untaxed Cost	€0.43	€0.35

The fuel coupon pricing system may appear complicated and at times seems to be working against market trends, but any changes in market prices are passed on to the BFG motorist in as fair and prompt a way as possible.

New Tougher Road Traffic Laws in France

Rules For Carriage Of Civilians & Dependants ID Cards In BFG

Policy. Standing Instructions for British Forces Germany Number 3217 – Families Administration provide the policy and guidance regarding the requirement to carry Civilian and Dependant Identity Cards for personnel stationed in Germany. Serving personnel are already in possession of a military ID Card and are therefore unaffected by these rules.

Control and Entitlement.

HQ BFG G1 Casualty & Compassionate are the department responsible for the policy and issue of civilian and dependant ID cards across Germany. There are four categories of Civilian and Dependant ID Card:

- Green 'Head of Household' Civilian ID Card issued to all entitled MOD Civil Servants (including SCE) and Sponsored organisations' employees including SSAFA, WRVS and DMWS.
- Blue 'Dependant' ID Card issued to dependant spouses and children of serving personnel, MOD Civil Servants (including SCE) and Sponsored organisations' employees.
- Red 'Head of Household' Civilian ID Card issued to all entitled Contractor Staff.
- Yellow 'Dependant ID' Card issued to dependant spouses and children of entitled Contractor Staff.

Both the Green and Blue ID Cards identify the bearer as holding full BFG Status including entitlement to medical and dental treatment under British Forces Germany Health Service (BFGHS). The Red and Yellow ID Cards confirms limited BFG Status has been granted by HQ BFG Civil Secretariat, which does not include entitlement to medical and dental treatment from BFGHS.

Dependant Children.

All dependant children are required to carry a Civilian ID card from the age of 8 until they reach their 25th birthday, the point at which BFG Status ceases. This applies also to children who attend schools and universities outside Germany and who visit their parents under the School Children's Visits scheme.

Application Process.

All initial and renewal applications for Civilian and Dependant ID Cards are to be made through Unit Welfare Offices, who are mandated to maintain a local register of applications, replacements and withdrawal of ID cards, ie for when families leave Germany. Unit Welfare Offices will advise on the correct procedure for applications thus ensuring the correct supporting documentation and appropriate photographs are provided in accordance with SI BFG 3217.

De-registration.

Civilian and Dependant ID Cards are to be cancelled when the holder leaves BFG permanently or when BFG Dependant Status ceases. It is essential that all ID cards are handed back to Unit Welfare Offices for return to HQ BFG G1 Casualty & Compassionate.

Temporary Identity Certificates

These are issued through Unit Welfare Offices for circumstances such as; pending initial or replacement of lost or damaged cards; to cover the withdrawal of ID cards prior to the holders departure from BFG or for any family visits. Temporary ID Cards are normally valid for one month from the date of issue.

BFG Vehicles Travelling to Northern Ireland


All BFG personnel travelling to Northern Ireland on leave and taking their RHD BFG registered vehicle with them are to remove the 'Emission Sticker' attached to their windscreen before they arrive in Northern Ireland.

On return to BFG they are to apply for a new 'Emission Sticker' using Annex H to Section 4 to SOBFG 3213. The application is to be signed and stamped by the unit admin office confirming travel had been for leave. The 'Emission Sticker' will then be replaced free of charge.



The French authorities have recently introduced a series of tougher measures which will apply to all drivers on French roads.

Whilst it has been an offence in France for a number of years, under article R413-15 of the French 'Code de la Route' (highway code) to use equipment that can detect a radar signal.



As a result of the changes, the French government has installed hundreds of new speed cameras and is said to be slowly removing all road signs indicating the location of existing fixed speed camera sites. Public information about the location of fixed radars will also no longer be

available and the map indicating the location of speed cameras has been withdrawn from the Government website. In most cases, it seems the speed camera warning signs are being replaced by speed warning signs, which simply signal your speed. These signs may be placed at any distance from the speed trap itself, contrary to previous practice when warning signs were placed several hundred metres from it. Police are being vigilant in their enforcement of the law.

you need to know

By way of dispensation, the use of warning devices that signal 'accident black spots' (where there may or may not be speed cameras), will continue to be permitted. The accident black spots have yet to be defined by the government.

Those with existing speed camera detection systems are required to bring them into conformity with the regulations, a process which can be done over the internet, by simple deactivation of the function, or by

a visit to the garage for those devices built integrally into the car.

Older versions not capable of being altered will need to be removed from the vehicle.



For those with GPS via a Smartphone, then it will be necessary to charge a new version available over the internet e.g. App Store, Android Market.

Don't Lose Your Vote!

Thousands of members of the Armed Forces could lose their chance to vote this year if they do not fill in a voter registration form.

Each year Service personnel at home, overseas or on deployed operations cannot have their say in elections because they do not register to vote by the deadline. Now, Armed Forces personnel are being encouraged to go along to a unit registration day, to be held at units throughout February 2012, or download and fill in a registration form - see Related Links.

Local government elections will take place in many parts of England, Wales and Scotland on Thursday 3rd May 2012. There will also be elections for the Greater London Assembly and Mayor of London on the same day.

personnel who know they will be abroad on Thursday 3 May 2012, or who can't make it to a polling station in person



for another reason, can apply to vote by post or by choosing a proxy - a person they trust to vote on their behalf.


Each year RESPECT is given €5000 to distribute to local youth groups and organisations. All of the groups



Martina also recommends www.reviews.cnet.com. This site belongs to David Carnoy and he advises you how to self publish an ebook. He gives very detailed advice on other sites that will help you decide where to go for further advice. He also gives a detailed breakdown on how much individual companies charge and brief advice on Amazon Kindle.

www.Scribd.com aspires to be the literary equivalent of youtube. So getting your book on this site is a good

way for people to access it. If you would like further information, then google ebook publishing.

Different guidelines are offered if you want to



publish children's books . Librarian, Carol Yates, has a great knowledge of books and has written some stories herself. She says, "It's important to do some thorough research if you want to sell your book. One book I would recommend is 'Writers and Artists Year Book' that has got information on everything you could possibly want to know about writing. It gives you all the rules that you need to follow".

One definite rule is that a children's book should be 32 pages long exactly including illustrations – a point that is worth knowing. Also, many publishers don't necessarily want to read your script initially, but would rather you send a letter telling them a bit about yourself and the book. There is also the chance that a specific publisher is just looking for a certain style of book.

Whatever book you want to write, just follow the guidelines - and good luck.

Ideas for Families

Amsterdam - Amsterdam is more suited for a weekend visit, best seen by boat on one of the many canals which circle the heart of the city. Recommended sights; Queen's Palace, the Old Mint Tower, Diamond factories and Portuguese Synagogue. North of the city – Volendam, Edam and Marken give a glimpse of the "Old Holland" – quaint villages with traditional dykes and decorated wooden houses, where the locals wear native costumes. The many Gasthauses with their pavement tables and chairs all blend in and just walking around the town is a joy itself. Visit the Velvet Caves, Sprookjesbos, a theme park set in restful woody surroundings, and Valkanier theme park. Thermae 2000 is a wonderful thermal pool next to a Casino. 




Free Asthma Guide For Children

World Asthma Day is on 1 May and a UK Asthma charity is currently offering a free 'My Asthma' pack for children.

'My Asthma' is a free self-management resource designed for children aged around 6-11. By using My Asthma, your child will be able to understand more about their asthma, their medicines and how to better control their





The "My Asthma" pack contains:

My Asthma Plan - similar to our Personal Asthma Action Plan but designed specifically for children ensuring it's engaging and accessible for the age group. It lists the medicines your child is on and what to do if their asthma gets worse.

89% of parents surveyed said they felt My Asthma Plan helped their child understand their asthma better.

My Asthma Calendar - a wall calendar with stickers for children to log how their asthma is each day and the medicines they have taken.

80% of parents surveyed thought the calendar helped their child understand their asthma symptoms better.

My Child's Asthma Medicines Postcard - a postcard for parents and other carers which records the medicines the child is on and what to do if their asthma gets worse.

Half of parents surveyed found the medicines postcard useful, with many giving them to their child's school. For a copy of the free pack - go to: www.asthma.org.uk and click on the My Asthma publication link on the right hand side of the front page.

Waiting for a Doctor's appointment?

If you don't need your medical appointment or can't make it for whatever reason, it's really important you phone up and let us know, rather than just not turning up. There are only a certain number of appointments available each day, and not turning up wastes both the doctors' and nurses' time when they could be seeing other patients.

Did you know that in February 2012, JHQ and Elmpt medical centres had:

- 73 missed appointments (ie. not cancelled, just no shows)
- 53 were doctor's appointments
- 20 were nurse appointments
- A total of 18 hours wasted clinician's time
 - 42 were dependants, UKBCs, UKSCs, NAAFI
 - 31 were military

Suffering With Hay Fever?

Hay fever is a common allergic condition that affects up to 1 in 5 people at some point in their life.

Symptoms of hay fever include:

- sneezing
- a runny nose
- itchy eyes

The symptoms of hay fever are caused when a person has an allergic reaction to pollen, a fine powder released by plants as part of their reproductive cycle. Pollen contains proteins that can cause the nose, eyes, throat and sinuses (small air-filled cavities behind your cheekbones and forehead) to become swollen, irritated and inflamed.

You can have an allergy to:

- tree pollen, released during spring
- grass pollen, released during the end of spring and beginning of summer
- weed pollen, released any time from early spring to late autumn

Many people find that their symptoms improve as they get older. Around half of people report some improvement in symptoms after several years. In around 10%-20% of people symptoms go away completely.

There is currently no cure for hay fever but most people are able to relieve symptoms with treatment, at least to a certain extent.

In an ideal world, the most effective way to control hay fever would be to avoid exposure to pollen. However, it's very difficult to avoid pollen, particularly during the summer months when you want to spend more time outdoors. Treatment options for hay fever include antihistamines, which can help prevent an allergic reaction from happening and corticosteroids (steroids), which help reduce levels of inflammation and swelling.

Many cases of hay fever can be controlled using over-the-counter medication available from your pharmacist. But if your symptoms are more troublesome it's worth speaking to your GP as you may require prescription medication.

For persistent and severe hay fever there is also a type of treatment called immunotherapy where you are exposed to small amounts of pollen over time in order to build up a resistance to its allergic effects. However, this can take many months or even years to be effective.

Self-help tips

It is sometimes possible to prevent the symptoms of hay fever by taking some basic precautions, such as:

- wearing wraparound sunglasses to stop pollen getting in your eyes when you are outdoors
- changing your clothes and taking a shower after being outdoors to remove the pollen on your body
- trying to stay indoors when the pollen count is high (over 50).

That, for me, is the perfect metaphor for JHQ; although the core of it has gone, the framework still remains."

When a member of the family is deployed on operations, those left behind at home face a challenging time as they learn to adapt to new family dynamics and increased responsibilities, all the while coping with constant and increased levels of tension and anxiety. This can sometimes be even more challenging for those posted overseas, far away from the friends and family they would normally turn to in times of need.

SSAFA Forces Help is working hard to meet the extra demand for support caused by increased deployments across British Forces Germany, and to continue the regular and enduring help it gives to servicemen, women and their families, year in year out.

SSAFA's Community Volunteers are trained to befriend and support those going through periods of isolation or difficulty. As well as providing a listening ear, they offer practical help such as providing transport to a hospital appointment or emergency childcare, and they are able to give advice on what other agencies and organisations can offer.

Some volunteers have undertaken comprehensive and specialist training to be able to offer support to families with more specific needs, for example adoptive families and those with an additional need or disability.


The Carer Support Scheme began in Germany in September 2007 as an offshoot of the highly successful Children's Short Breaks, for children with an additional need or disability, their siblings and young carers. Parents and Holiday Volunteers asked if SSAFA Forces Help could provide regular help throughout the year that would give occasional respite to parents and allow for time to be spent with siblings whilst volunteers engaged with the child with an additional need or disability.

Volunteer Karen has been spending time with Tilly, aged 6, once a week for the past two years. Tilly has been diagnosed autistic and her family is currently based in Germany, far away from extended family, so the two hours that Tilly and Karen, whom Tilly affectionately calls "my lady", spend together at the playground gives the rest of the family a much-needed break. As elder sibling Dominic, aged 13, said; "We had time to play a board game out in the sun". Mum Claire added, "We're able to relax knowing that Karen is fully trained and knows how to deal with Tilly, and that Tilly is safe".

Before Karen was introduced to Tilly, the family found it difficult going to places where there were a lot of people because Tilly would become upset and agitated and want to come home. When Karen first took Tilly to the park, she tried to run all the way home. Now she will play happily and confidently alongside other children.


A family may self-refer to the Scheme or, with the consent of the family, be referred by any agency,

including British Forces Social Work Service, SSAFA Health Service, AWS, Education and Post-Adoptive Social Services or Educational psychologists. Trained volunteers are then




one-to-one basis, the volunteer will support the child for a few hours each week, fortnight or month, as agreed by the volunteer and family.

One either discovers God or gives in to despair

Some years ago I went on a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. For nearly two weeks I followed with the other pilgrims in the footsteps of Christ. We visited Bethlehem, Nazareth and Jerusalem. We climbed the Mount of Beatitudes and Mount Tabor where Jesus was transfigured. I swam in the Dead Sea (or rather I floated!). I travelled from Galilee through Jericho to Jerusalem. At Jericho I looked into Jacob's Well. I prayed at the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus agonized before his approaching death and climbed Calvary where he was crucified. Everywhere we went, we took our gospel with us and read the appropriate passage. It was a moving experience. I still have vivid memories of it all. The Bible and the Gospel became alive! But the strongest impression I have retained is that of the desert where Christ spent forty days before starting his public life.


What is impressive about the desert is its sheer aridness. There is no vegetation, no bird life and, apart from the odd tiny lizard, almost no animals. After my visit there, I came to realise the significance of the desert. The desert is a purgatory man must pass through to reach paradise.

The silence is almost total. In that bleak landscape, nothing comes between man and his God. One either discovers God or gives in to despair. It is no wonder that those Bedouins who ply the salt trade following their caravans across the desert are deeply religious. No life thrives here except the inner life. It is not surprising

that it was the Desert Fathers who created that great institution dedicated to fostering the inner life, Western monasticism

Living now as many of us do, in built-up areas constantly bombarded with the roar of traffic and the blare of electronic music, we are in danger of failing to listen to our deepest yearnings and with that our inner life. Today, I do believe, we need to create a time and a space to nurture an important aspect of our lives - our spirituality.

Lent could be such a time, to begin. The Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness and he remained there for forty days. Let the Holy Spirit lead us out into the desert this Lent where we can confront the devils that haunt our lives, and like him too, triumph over them. That is the freedom, dignity, and gift that faith offers us. Should you require someone to talk to, we chaplains are here to help you. Don't be afraid!



BFG Driving Permit (BFG 57)

BFG European Regulations Test (The European Highway Code

BFG, has undertaken that anyone driving in Germany, The Netherlands and Belgium should have an adequate knowledge of the Road traffic Laws and has subsequently therefore produced the BFG European Traffic Regulations test (Highway Code) All drivers of any rank, whether Soldier, civilian or dependant, are to pass the BFG European Traffic Regulations test (Highway Code) before they are issued with a permit to drive BFG Driving Permit (BFG Form

The BFG European Traffic Regulation Test (sometimes referred to as the Tick Test) can be taken at the following centres within JHQ:

Garrison Transport Office (Snyder's Road) RSU Welfare Office (Oakham Way)

The GTO is providing the option for BFG European Traffic Regulation Test on an appointment based service, commencing from: Mon - Thurs 08.00 - 16.00 and Fri 08.00 - 12.00. All appointments are monitored through the Admin Section on 02161 4722274

Testing Process:

Revise the test by use of BFG Publication B6 (A Guide to Driving in Germany, Belgium and Holland). Go to one of the test centres and sit the test, this is a computer generated test. You will have the facility to practice first if required. If you are unsuccessful you will be allowed to attempt the test again a maximum of 2 tests can be sat in a day.Once the test has been completed and passed the test invigilator will print off your pass certificate and fill out a BFG 9a (Application for a BFG Driving Permit). All personnel must acquaint themselves with Standing Orders (Posters within centres). Once the BFG Form 9a has been completed take this form to the RSU BFG office and a BFG Driving Permit (BFG Form 57) will be issued.

All drivers are on the initial issue of a BFG Driving Permit to undertake the European Traffic Regulation test (Highway Code). There is no requirement to re-take this test on the renewal of this permit (BFG Driving Permit BFG 57) at the

Minstry of Defence MT Driver's Permit (FMT 600)

The process for obtaining an FMT 600 for dependants who are required to drive MoD vehicles as part of their employment are to report to their Line Manager in the first instance and then to the Driver Training office within the GTO complex Snyder's Road JHQ. This will involve a driving assessment prior to the issue of an FMT 600.
