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## Valedictory From Garrison Commander Brigadier Jon Watson

"May you live in interesting times." No one quite knows the origin of that statement, though it's purported to be a Chinese proverb, or even a curse. It became popular after John Kennedy used it in a speech he gave in Cape Town on 7 June 1966, yet it seems truer today than ever before. And 'interesting times' these certainly are, with seismic, game-changing reforms beginning radically to reshape the way we work, live, and operate. I say 'reform', because these changes go far beyond any of the evolutionary adjustments that have resulted from the many reviews and studies I have seen – and contributed to – over the last 30 years. Among them, there are three that seem crucial.

The Defence Reform agenda will transform the way we work. Making Head Office smaller, leaner and more strategic will also make it more political, more directive and less consultative. We will pay for years of inter-Service squabbling through reduced military influence at the highest level. We will see the impact of a crisis of confidence between the civil and military spheres that is arguably as dire as it was when Harold Wilson suspected Lord Mountbatten of secretly contemplating (and even planning for) a military takeover. At the same time, Service Chiefs will become more accountable and Land Command's structure will become flatter, contributing to agility and responsiveness in a resource-constrained environment. But 'empowerment' cuts both ways: culturally speaking we readily shoulder added responsibility; but are we braced for our authority to be questioned, scrutinized and second-guessed at every turn?

The New Employment Strategy will transform the way we live. These are early days in the planning process, but already the nascent supergarrison concept is being taken to the next level. A more home-based, more static, less expeditionary-minded force will no doubt yield benefits in terms of stability for our service personnel, and especially their families. But it will also fatally undermine the long-held principle of accompanied service which all of us in Germany have taken for granted for so many years. The idea of the Army as a vocation, a way of life, of being paid for 24 hours rather than 9 to 5, of being subsidised to ensure continuity of education for our children, of spouses 'following the flag': these things go to the very heart of what we are as an organisation, and of who we are as servants of the Crown. Do we understand, and are we ready for, the fundamental changes in the underlying military ethos that will result?



Future Force 2020 will transform the way we operate, and here the future is even less clear. It is apparent, though, that the short-termism inherent in our Parliamentary democracy dooms us endlessly to repeat a schoolboy error: that of extrapolating the lessons of the current operation in willful ignorance of the broad sweep of history. So the perceived success of NATO in the Libyan coastal strip has its downsides. It unhelpfully eclipses the very significant lessons we have learned in Afghanistan about the costly and protracted nature of ground operations in a landlocked country, and it falsely suggests that such operations will always be a discretionary rather than necessary part of foreign interventions, humanitarian missions included. So, when (not if) the next international crisis comes along, will we still be able to conduct high intensity armoured ground manoeuvre operations in contact with a determined and well-armed enemy?

It's easy to become disheartened by the developments we see around us. Yet as I travel around Germany I never fail to be impressed and encouraged by the energy and professionalism of our people, be they military or civilian. They – you – know that there's still a job to be done, and an important one at that. And you are doing it remarkably well, each and every day, in a spirit of selflessness and with a smile on your faces. So, as I leave the Garrison, the Germany Support Group and now the Army, I have a better saying to offer. You'll be familiar with "carpe diem", of course. But the full quote from the Latin poem by Horace is: "Carpe diem, quam minimum credula postero". It means: "Seize the day, and don't worry too much about the future".

Be well, and stay safe.

# Remembrance 2011



With conflict ongoing in Afghanistan, and Garrison troops having returned recently from Op Ellamy, plus the Royal British Legion (RBL) celebrating its 90th Anniversary, the Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday services, in the region, took on a further significance this year.

## Reichswald



The Garrison organised its Armistice Day Parade at Reichswald Forest Commonwealth War Cemetery, on behalf of the RBL, replacing the parade that is normally held on the Joint Headquarters forecourt. During the service, a two-minute silence was observed, which was traditional, was timed to start at 11am on the 11th day, of the 11th month; which reflects the moment that the guns fell silent at the end of The Great War, in 1918. Wreaths were laid in memory of the fallen; this included ones laid by GOC UKSC Maj Gen Nicholas Caplin, British Consul-General Malcolm Scott, the RBL, Royal Air Force Association, and representatives of the three Armed Services.



## Elmpt Station

Elmpt Station Remembrance Day Service was held on Sunday 13 November in Hangar 3, Javelin Barracks. The service was held for soldiers and their families, and it was presided over by Father Danny Hernandez.

After the service was finished, wreaths were then laid during a moving Parade held at the Elmpt Station Memorial by representatives from, among other units, 7 and 16 Signal Regiments, Elmpt Station and the RBL.

Small wooden crosses, holding a poppy, were also planted around the Elmpt Station Memorial by soldiers



and their families, as a way to pay their individual respects to the fallen, and anyone that they may have known personally.

## Support Squadron's Final Remembrance Day

With the disbandment of 7 Signal Regiment next year, its Support Squadron's Remembrance Day Service had an added note of poignancy this year, as it will be the last to be held at Rheinberg Commonwealth War Cemetery. A large number of soldiers and their families attended the service, at which Maj Andrew Burdge, CO Sp Sqn, and Bob Francis, the RBL Rheindahlen Branch Secretary were among those who laid a wreath.

It has become traditional for the Support Squadron to hold the service at the Rheinberg Cemetery to symbolise the links formed when 7 Signal Regiment were based at Krefeld. Speaking after the ceremony,

So it is a poignant day, to be holding the final service here. Especially as we have soldiers serving in Afghanistan at the moment. It is also lovely to have our families here as well. 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# 231 Goes Out "On A High"

Current and past members of 231 Squadron, 7th Signal Regiment, gathered for a poignant disbandment parade in October, to give the 60-year-old Squadron a fitting send off.

The disbandment of 231 Squadron saw the first step towards the full disbandment of 7th Signal Regiment next summer. The Regiment's closure comes as a result of last year's Strategic Defence and Security Review (SDSR).

For the disbandment parade, 231 Sqn was accompanied by two of 7 Sig Regt's other squadrons, 229 Sqn and Sp Sqn. The third, 232 Sqn, is deployed currently in Afghanistan, as part of NATO led Op Eagle.

Taking the salute on the day was the Commanding Officer of 7 Sig Regt, Lt Col Al Long, and during a speech to the troops he paid tribute to the Sqn's proud history, and especially their very successful operational tour to Afghanistan, which finished at the end of July, "Whatever you do in life you should finish on a high,

and you really are finishing on a high. The professional standard that you set in Afghanistan was exceptional, so I am very proud of you for that."

At the end of the parade, the members of 231 Sqn marched off for their final time as a unit; ready to make the transfer to their next assignments, and Maj Eric Warren, Officer In Command of 231Sqn explained that fortunately the transition should be smooth for most of the soldiers and their families, "For many of the families, there will not be too much disruption because they are staying in the Garrison, or the localised area, at least for now. A lot have received the posting that they asked for, so generally that has been very good news."

As the Squadron's closure begins the sad process of disbanding the first regiment in the Royal Corps of Signals to be affected by the SDSR cuts, the message from the CO remains quite clear; that members of 231 Signal Squadron should, "Look back with pride and fond memories at their time here, but they should also look forward to the next challenge."



# Elmpt Will Remain A "Great Facility"

The decision to disband 7th Signal Regiment was taken as a result of the Strategic Defence and Security Review announced in October 2011. The disbandment of one of its squadron's last month, 231 Squadron, is the first step towards the eventual closure of the whole of 7 Signal Regiment by 31st July 2012. The challenge of disbanding the Regiment, with its long and proud history dating back 126 years, falls to its Commanding Officer Lt Col Al Long.

Lt Col Long has spoken to the bulletin about the reasons for the disbandment, and the efforts that he, and his team, are making to ensure that the process will be accomplished as smoothly as possible, and with as little disturbance as possible to the soldiers, their families and the wider Garrison.

"7 Signal Regiment's role has been dedicated to supporting HQ ARRC, as part of our commitment to NATO. However, one of the many decisions of SDSR was to reduce the level of support that was provided to HQ ARRC, and unfortunately, as a result of that, 7 Signal Regiment was targeted for disbandment.

"The order from Land was to disband the Regiment by 31st July 2012. We are doing that in two stages, by Easter 231, 232 and LAD will be disbanded, and the remainder, which is 229 and the Sp Sqn will be disbanded by summer 2012."

After the closure of 231 Squadron there were approximately 350 soldiers still left to be reassigned in the Regiment, and Lt Col Al Long explained the planning that had been made to ensure the disruption and stress would be reduced for his troops, and their families.

"We have been proactive on the posting side, starting the process early, and we are having a very good hit rate with Glasgow, a lot of people are getting their first choices. We are trying to ensure a smooth transition for soldiers and their families. The family and welfare side of life is very strong in the Regiment, and we spent a lot of time planning, because it is critically important to get that right, particularly for a unit based overseas.

Presently the Garrison's two Signal Regiments, 7 and 16, are both located on Javelin Barracks, with the



housing footprint falling on both Javelin and Wildenrath. The Garrison has already announced that, due to the fall in numbers with the disbandment of 7 Signal Regiment, Wildenrath will close completely towards the end of 2012, which will result in the remaining families being moved elsewhere in the Garrison. Lt Col Long also commented on how these changes would affect the remaining population in Elmpt.

"Clearly, the departure of 7 Signal Regiment will reduce the population of Elmpt Station quite significantly, and that is clearly going to be a challenge for the Garrison; fewer numbers will make it harder to organise things, but it is quite manageable. I hope that between myself and the CO of 16 Signal Regiments, we have got that covered. It is not just a question of us up sticks and leaving, we have to get this right for everybody in the Garrison.

We still have good facilities in Javelin, and I am confident that with those remaining, or moving into Javelin, it will remain a good place to live. There are great facilities like Brügggen School, AWS Childcare and Youth Club facilities, Home-Start, SSAFA and many other community and welfare organisations, so there will be more than enough people to ensure it remains a great facility in the future."

Looking to the future of the last few months of 7 Signal Regiment, and beyond, Lt Col Long summed up the general feeling of the affected soldiers and their families, "It is business as usual; we have a task to do, and we get on with it, although there is some sadness. I think people are busy, some people are still on operations, and I am confident that people are looking forward to their next task; their next challenge."

## Signal Pair Return From Op Ellamy

Lt Abbie Roberts and Cpl Rob Charlton, both of 229 Signal Squadron, 7 Sig Regt, have recently returned from deployment as part of Op Ellamy, the NATO mission to enforce UN Resolution 1973, to protect civilians in Libya. Speaking of their role in the British operation that formed part of Operation Unified Protector Lt Abbie Roberts explained, "We provided NATO communications in support of RAF sorties. It enabled RAF units in Italy to task missions accordingly for Tornado's and Typhoons. I really enjoyed it, it was a fantastic experience, and as a relatively inexperienced Officer it was an eye-opening mission to be a part of. Cpl Rob Charlton agrees, "I was working with a really small team, and it became a tight knit relationship. It was a very good tour.

**1 On the 1st day of Christmas**  
• Check your Christmas tree lights conform to the British Standard. Always use a residual current device (safety device that can save lives by instantly switching off power) on outdoor electrical equipment.



**2 On the 2nd day of Christmas**  
• Never place candles near your Christmas tree or furnishings.

**3 On the 3rd day of Christmas**  
• Make sure your family and visitors staying for the festive period know what to do in an emergency. Make a fire escape plan.



**4 On the 4th day of Christmas**  
• Decorations can burn easily - don't attach them to lights or heaters.

**5 On the 5th day of Christmas**  
• Never overload electrical sockets. Take special care with Christmas lights. Always switch Christmas lights off and unplug them before you go to bed.



**6 On the 6th day of Christmas**  
• Celebrate Christmas and New Year safely. The risk of accidents, especially in the kitchen, is greater after alcohol is consumed.



**7 On the 7th day of Christmas**  
• Most fires start in the kitchen - never leave a cooker unattended.

**8 On the 8th day of Christmas**  
• If you are planning to celebrate with fireworks, store them in a metal box, read the instructions, never go back to a lit firework and keep a bucket of water nearby.

**9 On the 9th day of Christmas**  
• Make sure cigarettes are completely extinguished before going to bed.

**10 On the 10th day of Christmas**  
• Check the battery in your smoke alarm every week and use Christmas as a reminder to clean it and remove dust.



**11 On the 11th day of Christmas**  
• Keep candles, lighters and matches out of the reach of children. Never leave burning candles unattended.



**12 On the 12th day of Christmas**  
• Take the time to check on elderly relatives and neighbours this Christmas - make sure they are fire safe.

## FIRE SAFETY The 12 Days of Christmas



### New Year Fireworks Celebrations

Having fireworks at home can be great fun, as long as they are used safely. Figures have shown that more children than adults get hurt by fireworks.

Only one person should be in charge of fireworks. If that's you, then make sure you take all the necessary precautions. Read the instructions in daylight and don't drink any alcohol until all fireworks have been set off. Make your preparations in advance, and in daylight or with a torch (never a naked flame). On the night, you will need...

1. A torch
2. A bucket or two of water
3. Eye protection and gloves
4. A bucket of soft earth to put fireworks in
5. Suitable supports and launchers if you're setting off Catherine wheels or rockets.





## Salmond House Closes

In December 2011 the last students will leave Salmond House Training Centre (SHTC) and by March 2012 the centre will close. SHTC opened in its current location on the 14<sup>th</sup> of June 1994 when the Royal Air Force Germany's higher educational establishment merged with the Army's Higher Education Centre (Germany) which had, since the end of World War 2, variously been located in Göttingen, Hannover, Hohne, Dortmund and Mülheim an der Ruhr.

Since 1994 SHTC has provided higher level German language training to personnel from all three Services who have gone on to serve in embassies, liaison and exchange posts and to study in German Staff College. Since 2006 SHTC has also delivered Dutch language

training. Over and above language training SHTC has provided IT training and conference facilities for units and headquarters from across British Forces Germany.

## BFG Local Overseas Allowance (LOA) Review Results

As many readers are aware, a full review of LOA for Germany took place in July of this year. The aim of the review was to ensure that the allowance captures all necessary expenditure incurred to maintain the average standard of living in BFG when compared to UK based Service Personnel. The entire process was observed by HQ UKSC to obtain an understanding of the review and to make certain the LOA Review Team had an accurate picture of life in BFG. LOA Rates in the US Zone and Isolated Detachments (ISOSETS) were also reviewed. Ultimately, so long as the conventions (that is the various goods, services bought and the assessment of the average lifestyle) of LOA accurately reflected the way we live in Germany then, should the rate go up or down, it will accurately contribute towards the cost of day to day living

As a result of the work completed before, during and after the review a clear and updated understanding of the financial demands when serving in Germany were realised. The outcome is that the vast majority of Service Personnel in BFG will receive an increase in LOA of between approximately 13 to 21 percent.

A further outcome of this year's review was that LOA Rates across Germany for BFG Main, US Zone and ISOSETS fell within a few percentage points of each other. Over time ISOSET/US Zone rates have oscillated around the Germany Main rate and so it has been decided that now is an opportune time to harmonise the rate to a single rate for Germany, as is the case for example for those assigned to different locations within overseas countries e.g. USA. As such the separate rates for the US Zone and ISOSETS will be removed and all personnel in Germany will now move onto a single rate of LOA from 1 Dec 11. Less than 1% of the Germany based community will be affected by this change and some personnel may see a slight reduction in the rate of LOA received as a result. Those that see a reduction will not have the new rate applied until 1 Jan 12.

The table below shows the revised rate for personnel based in Germany Main Areas as well as the previous rates. Increases will be effective from 1 Dec 11 with reductions implemented from 1 Jan 12:

## SDSR Allowance Savings for 2012 – A Reminder

SDSR allowance savings measures were published and briefed to all Service Personnel in January of this year and included a number of changes to the construct of LOA. As a result of these changes you will remember that the rate of LOA was reduced from 1 May. Service Personnel were also briefed at the SDSR announcement on further but delayed reductions that will be introduced on 1 Apr 12. As a reminder, in addition to a number of changes to LOA as a whole, the following significant changes to LOA, which will trigger these further SDSR reductions, will apply to North West Europe (France, Belgium, Germany and the Netherlands):

- LOA assumes that on assignment to BFG a Service Person and their dependants will use the "official" method of travel from the UK, this is currently the Germany Air Trooping Service. As a result there is an element within LOA called "Car Buy / Sell" which assumes that your car is sold in the UK prior to assignment and a new car is purchased on arrival in BFG. On assignment back to the UK the "Germany car" is sold and another bought on return to the UK. As this tends not to be the case in practice, the Car Buy / Sell element will be removed and will be replaced by an entitlement to claim travel costs to and from the UK to North West Europe on posting.
- The remaining 6 "Bett Nights", a provision in LOA which contributed toward food and accommodation in a hotel in lieu of long weekends with friends and family if you had been serving in the UK, will be removed from the LOA conventions for North West Europe. This will result in a reduction in the LOA rates but will be compensated for by the provision of an additional two Get You Home (Overseas) journeys per year, giving a total of three in a twelve month period.

## In Summary -

The SDSR savings measures announced in January this year, with a second phase on changes to be implemented on 1 Apr 12, has not prevented the MOD from ensuring that LOA provides a realistic contribution to the additional cost of day to day living in Germany based on how LOA is presently calculated. The full results of the LOA review have been sent to units and they are also available on the BFG Net and the SPVA Website Library (via the JPA Portal).

## BFG Vehicle Licensing Office Christmas 2011 Deadline

Any member of BFG wishing to register/renew a vehicle prior to Christmas should note that BFG Vehicle Licensing Office JHQ will close for the Christmas break from Wednesday 21 December.

All applications received by 09 December will be dispatched back to the customer by the last post on 16 December, in accordance with BFPO Posting dates for Parcels and Letters.

It should also be noted that many Local BFG Offices will shut down earlier than the BFGVLO. Customers should therefore check local arrangements to ensure their documents are submitted in time to enable collection from their local office before Christmas.

The BFG VLO will re-open on Tuesday 03 January 2012.



## Changes reporting faults in silent hours

After three months in service Babcock have jointly reviewed the out of hours procedure and it has been agreed that the 0800 888 4242 number will be used as a one stop contact number at any time.



It is intended that, going forward, all calls in silent hours are made directly to the Babcock Helpdesk and are no longer screened by the duty officer. Babcock will respond and make emergency situations safe. The repair or reinstatement of service will be dealt with in normal working hours.

Example of situations that may require an emergency /make safe response:-

- Issues causing an immediate health and safety risk to persons
- Issues affecting the security of an asset
- Faults causing serious damage to an asset
- Faults causing a breakdown in the supply of power, water and heating to an asset that is occupied 24/7
- Issues likely to cause a major environmental incident
- Faults causing a failure of an asset to remain statutory compliant

## Overseas Veteran's Medical Expenses

In 2009, a review of the Armed Forces Compensation Scheme (AFCS) was undertaken by Admiral the Lord Boyce on behalf of the MOD. Although the scheme was found to be fundamentally sound, the former Chief of Defence Staff did make several recommendations for improvement.

The MOD has subsequently implemented the changes and on the 9<sup>th</sup> May 2011, the final tranche of legislation became effective. (Further information is available from 2011DIN01-204 Armed Forces Compensation Scheme).

Under the revised scheme, one significant change being introduced means that seriously injured ex-Service personnel who move permanently overseas after leaving the Armed Forces may be eligible to get their medical expenses paid. As long as individuals are deemed eligible, and the move is in the best interests of the individual's care needs, the SPVA may exercise this provision.

It is only those Service personnel who sustain injuries or become ill as a result of their Service who may be eligible to apply for this provision, and are required to fulfil the following criteria:

- Move Abroad (and apply for approval) within 12 months of leaving the Services. For those injured before this provision was introduced, they have until 09 May 2012 to apply and move.
- Be recognised as seriously injured as a result of service under the AFCS (i.e. in receipt of an AFCS award between levels 1-8).

## Getting Ready for Civvy Street?



The 'Remount' charity was set up by a former soldier who recognised that Armed Forces personnel needed help returning to civilian life. 'Remount' offers a springboard for Service men and women who are preparing to take the next step forward from Military life to civilian life.

The 'Remount Programme' is a four-day residential course based at Brathay Hall, near Lake Windermere in the UK. It is designed to offer personnel of all ranks and status and their dependants the chance to take control of their lives and achieve their full potential. With a mix of physical challenges and classroom learning, participants may discover strengths and weaknesses, and can learn how to harness their ability for a new life. Brathay is also well equipped to cater for amputees and disabled personnel.

Through the help of expert trainers, the courses being run are designed to touch on the subjects of stress and depression and may help service personnel recognise the relevance of the qualifications gained during military service.

The Programme is funded by a trust set up by a majority of ex Service people who understand how to overcome the transition difficulties. They also know how to have a happy, successful life. The course is free to all serving and ex-members of the Armed Forces, the only expense to the individual will be travel costs.



# Signallers Race To The Pole

When you wake up on New New's Day, spare a thought or two for WO1 (RSM) Sean McLroy, 7 Sig Regt, who will be part of a three-man team setting out in some of the most inhospitable and dangerous conditions on the planet to race to the South Pole, to raise money for ABF- The Soldiers' Charity, and Help for Heroes.



Sean is one third of Team Mercury, along with Capt Billy Morris and WO1 (RSM) Mark Morgan, both also serving in the Royal Corps of Signals, who will be competing in The South Pole 2011/12 Centenary Race. An extreme race commemorating the 1911 epic and tragic duel between a Norwegian team led by Roald Amundsen and an English team led by Capt Robert Falcon Scott, to be the first to reach the South Pole.

Setting off, on 1<sup>st</sup> January 2012, from a Russian outpost in Antarctica, along with around nine other teams from around the world, the determined trio will have to trek on skis for up to 18 hours a day, pulling behind them sledges containing all the food and equipment that they will need to survive in temperatures as low as -50 degrees, with winds of up to 80mph, at altitudes of up to 3000m, for between three to four weeks. Understandably the Polar Race has attracted international media attention, and the team have the approval for their mammoth challenge from the royal





## Health and Safety Seminar

For the first time ever, a joint Health and Safety at Work Expert Exchange of Experience Seminar, was held in JHQ recently, organised by Headquarters Rhine Garrison and the Catering Trade Association, (Berufsgenossenschaft für Nahrungsmittel und Gastgewerbe – BGN)

Health and Safety at Work is a subject that knows no borders. Nowadays, it has a very high priority throughout the European Union and, therefore, within our working environments. The presentations were restricted to the trade topics concerning hand and skin protection, as well as the current actual changes in legislation of hazardous substances. The HSWE Exchange of Experience Seminar ended after an excursion to the NATO Bunker Complex in Castlegate. Here, the ranges of safety technical aspects were explained to all the participants on site.

The day concluded with positive feedback from all participants, having gained a lot of new information.

The Rhine 14 – 19 Partnership Centre was launched officially on 28 January 2010. Its primary aim is to provide bespoke vocational training opportunities for young people in the Rhine area.

Since its launch, the Rhine 14-19 Partnership staff have worked to develop and coordinate opportunities offered by a number of training providers and organisations willing to offer a work placement within BFG. Young people have been supported in finding an appropriate placement in a work environment to gain experience and/or complete an accredited qualification. A range of opportunities are available, including Apprenticeships, National Vocational Qualifications and Key Skills Qualifications, whilst working full-time, part-time or, occasionally, whilst still attending school. Links between all members of the Rhine 14-19 Partnership (including the Careers Advisory Service) are well-established, making it possible to tailor training programmes to match the requirements of each learner.



Recent changes in legislation relating to Raising the Participation Age will soon come into force. This legislation makes it compulsory for young people who started in Year 7 in September 2008 to remain in learning until they are 17. Young people who started Year 7 in September 2009 or after will need to remain in learning until they are 18.

“The Education and Skills Act 2008 increases the minimum age at which young people in England can leave learning, requiring them to continue in education or training until the end of the academic year in which they turn 17 from 2013 and until their 18th birthday from 2015.

Raising the participation age (RPA) does not mean young people must stay in school; they will be able to choose one of the following options:

Full-time education, such as school, college or home education

Work-based learning, such as an Apprenticeship

Part-time education or training if they are employed, self-employed or volunteering for more than 20 hours a week.

Successfully achieving RPA will require all sections of the education system to play their part, and in particular local authorities will have a key role to champion the needs of young people in their areas and work with local partners to achieve full participation.” (DFE 2011)

The Rhine 14-19 Partnership is working strategically, continually developing the work-based infrastructure young people may choose to access in the future.

From September 2011, the full-time role of local Partnership Manager has been taken by Sharon Samy who has lived and worked in this area for a number of years. Sharon shares a base with the Awards Centre to the rear of the Rhine Garrison Youth Centre Building. Access is through the car parking area to the left of the main entrance. The Partnership Centre is open during normal working hours Monday to Friday. Young people and parents/carers are welcome to call in for advice about current opportunities at any time. Bearing in mind that the office may be closed if a client or partner is being visited, appointments can be made by telephone (02161 4952576 or 01722 175501) or by e-mail ([rhine14-19partnership@sceschools.com](mailto:rhine14-19partnership@sceschools.com)).

On 4 Nov 11, GOC UKSC Major General Nick Caplin led a short but moving closing ceremony at the Villa Spiritus in Bonn.

To the sound of a mournful lament played by Pipe Sergeant David Moir, the Union Flag was lowered for the last time to be folded and then handed over to the mayor of Bonn, Oberbürgermeister Jürgen Nimptsch, who accepted it as a symbol of the close relationship which has developed between British Forces Germany and the City of Bonn over a number of decades. To further signify the occasion, a ceremonial key was presented to Herr Andre Gregarek of the German Federal Property Agency representing the locking of the Villa and the end of 56 years of continued usage by British Forces in Germany.

## WHAT TO KEEP IN YOUR MEDICINE CABINET



Here is a list of useful medicines and dressings, with a description of their uses, that we recommend you keep in your medicine cabinet at home. All are quite cheap and worth stocking in readiness for minor illnesses.

Remember: Keep them in a box or cupboard with a lock and store them well out of reach of children

- Paracetamol and Ibuprofen: for adults and children over 16 years old. Good for headaches, colds, sore throats and painful bruises.
- Paracetamol Suspension (liquid form): for the relief of pain or fever in young children.
- Sedative Cough Linctus: for dry or painful coughs, but not coughs caused by common colds.
- 'Over the counter' cough medicines: there is no good evidence on the effectiveness of 'over the counter' cough medicines and they can be expensive; as such their use is not recommended. However, they can be used at your discretion. Warning; they should not be used for children two years old or younger.
- Vapour Rub: for steam inhalations or to rub onto chest or nose. Useful for children with stuffy noses or dry coughs.
- Antiseptic solution: one teaspoon diluted in warm water for cleaning cuts and grazes.
- Antiseptic cream: for treating spots, sores and grazes.
- Calamine Lotion: for dabbing (not rubbing) on insect bites, stings and sunburn.
- Dressing strips: for minor cuts
- Sterile Gauze squares: for cleaning cuts and grazes.
- Thermometer: to measure fevers and enable appropriate treatment
- Tweezers: for removing splinters and ticks



Remember that our Pharmacist can give you advice about medicines.

### Disposal of Unwanted Medicine

The Pharmacy can also dispose of any unwanted medicines which you may have in your home or accommodation. Remember - be safe and keep all medicines out of reach of children.

### IMPORTANT STUFF!

#### Cancelling appointments

If you don't need your medical appointment or can't make it for whatever reason, it is really important you phone up and let us know, rather than just not turning up. There are only a certain number of appointments available each day, and not turning up wastes both the doctors' and nurses' time when they could be seeing other patients.

#### Contact details

Please remember to notify your Medical Centre if you change your telephone contact details.

#### De-registering

If you are being posted, please don't forget to de-register at your Medical Centre before you go. If you don't, it will delay your medical records being sent to your new GP practice.

If you would like to come to the next Patient Participation Group (PPG) to give feedback directly to medical staff on our health service, the next meeting is on Wednesday 11 January 2012 at 1000 hrs at the RSU Welfare Centre.

Please be advised that all medical centres are closed on the Christmas and New Year Public Holidays - 24 (pm), 25, 26, 27 and 31 December 2011 and 1 January 2012.

If you are unwell on a Public Holiday, please telephone your local medical centre number. The centre will be unmanned, but you will automatically be diverted to the 24 hour telephone advisory service offering a nurse consultation and if required, arrangements will be made for you to be seen by our on-call doctor in Rheindahlen. If you need an emergency ambulance, you should call 112. Emergency services operate normally on Public Holidays.

On the other days between Christmas and New Year medical centres in JHQ and SHAPE will be offering

routine appointments in the mornings.

## WORLD'S AIDS DAY

World AIDS Day is on 1 December each year and the key purpose of highlighting this serious sexually transmitted infection (STI) is to stress the importance of getting tested. AIDS is not about being gay - heterosexuals can get HIV. In the absence of a 'cure' for AIDS, prevention remains the first line of defence. Condoms are the only proven barrier method available that protect against both unintended pregnancies and sexually transmitted infections, including HIV.

HIV stands for the Human Immunodeficiency Virus. It is a virus which attacks the body's immune system - the body's defence against diseases. It can be passed on through infected bodily fluids, most commonly via sex without a condom or by sharing infected needles, syringes or other injecting drug equipment. There are now more people than ever living with HIV in the UK - more than 90,000 - with around a quarter of those unaware they have the virus.

Here are a few more facts about HIV in the UK:

Over 90% of people with HIV were infected through sexual contact

You can now get tested for HIV using a saliva sample not available in BFG GUM Clinics

HIV is not passed on through spitting, biting or sharing utensils

Only 1% of babies born to HIV positive mothers have HIV (in the UK AND OTHER DEVELOPED COUNTRIES)  
There is still no vaccine and no cure for HIV.

If you know you're HIV positive then you can start treatment which is very effective now and prolongs life. The earlier you start treatment the more it affects your long term life chances.

HIV is now a treatable condition, people are now living with HIV not dying from it, however treatment is most effective when started early before people become unwell, starting treatment late has poorer outcomes than when started early.

If you are worrying about the impact of an HIV positive test on your military career, you have got your priorities wrong. Your life is far more important than any career. Testing for HIV is now routinely part of our Genito-Urinary-Medicine (GUM) services and the vast majority tested are negative, but please don't assume you are.

When Ali found out she started looking into careers that would be flexible enough to suit moving on. She found this difficult here in Germany because she doesn't speak the language and also there was a danger that the qualifications that she gained wouldn't be recognised when she returned back to the UK, so she had to look at UK courses.

She studied over weekends and she is now qualified to perform various beauty treatments. Ali said, "The courses were great but the cost and inconvenience of going back to UK was not so good. This is clearly not an option for many Army wives, particularly if they have to add on childcare costs as well".

This gave Ali the idea to run courses here in Germany. She said, "I am based in Paderborn and it is fairly central for the whole of BFG, so I have set up the first courses in Paderborn in February and after that I will continue to run courses on a monthly \ six weekly basis so that the girls can become fully qualified beauty therapists.







## U10 Tips to aid 'Safe Cycling'

- 1. Have a roadworthy bike that fits you** - Regularly check the brakes and tyre pressure, and don't ignore any strange noises, vibrations, or jumping gears - they probably indicate a problem. A new bike bought from a traditional, local bike shop should be safe.
- 2. Use the road** - If you are nervous about cycling on the road do get training. Cycling in parks and cycle paths is fine but you are missing out on the freedom to cycle, quickly and safely to wherever you want to go. Cycling on the pavement, even considerate cycling, is against the law (although the police will show discretion to younger children cycling on the pavement).
- 3. Think positioning** - Ride away from the kerb, never in the gutter, at least a door's width away from parked cars. Be aware that drivers tend to leave you the same room on your left as the room you leave for yourself on the right. Ride in the stream of traffic when you can match its speed. At times when you have to ride close to slower moving traffic or parked cars (i.e. on a narrow road) do so slowly so you have time to react to hazards such as an opening door.
- 4. Check behind frequently** - especially before changing position on the road. Looking behind attracts the attention of drivers as well as ensuring that you know what is happening around you.
- 5. See, be seen, and communicate!** - Communicate your intentions with hand signals and by correct road positioning. Don't signal without looking behind first - it may be unsafe to signal if someone is overtaking at that moment or it may be unnecessary to signal if no one is there. A driver is more likely to see your signal if you have looked behind first.
- 6. Be HGV/large vehicle/bus aware** - You are particularly at risk if cycling on the passenger side of an HGV as it turns right because of the poor right view from the cab (many have 'blind spots'). Do not 'hug the kerb' to undertake a large-sided vehicle (particularly when on approach to traffic lights/junctions). Ensure that you are positioned with enough space behind or in front of any large vehicle so the driver in the cabin can see you. Make sure you can see the vehicle's mirrors. If you can't see the mirror the driver probably can't see you.
- 7. Be seen** - It's so obvious yet is ignored by many cyclists. It's your responsibility to make sure you are visible. You can buy good high vis cycling jackets for a small price or high visibility cycling shirts. Use flashing lights on the back of your bike in the dark. These are a real attention grabber.
- 8. Pot Holes** - Watch out for these. If you make a regular commute you will get to know where they are. These are another reason why you should not hug the kerb. Study the road ahead all the time. Under no circumstance suddenly swerve out to avoid a pot hole on a road full of traffic. If you've been surprised by one and there's traffic behind you you'll have to ride through it. Stand up on your peddles to reduce the weight if you're forced to go over a pot hole. This is safer than swerving out into the road. Ideally though, if you keep away from the kerb and are paying attention, you should be able to avoid them. Being aware of everything going on around you is essential to cycling safely.
- 9. MP3 Players** - If you're listening to an mp3 player or radio when cycling then you are reducing your sensory perception drastically. A chunk of your concentration will be targeted to the music or radio whether you admit it or not. You need all your concentration focused on your ride. It may be ok to have music blasting from your car stereo, but for a cyclist your ears are a crucial part of your defence mechanism. You will hear the traffic behind you rather than see it.
- 10. Drop the 'Right Of Way' Attitude** - Having an inflexible 'I've got the right of way' attitude can get you into trouble. Let's get real here. You're a cyclist; a human being on a small piece of metal, the average car weighs in at between one and two tons. Technically, in certain situations, you may have the right of way, but if a selfish or inattentive driver pulls out on you, maybe he hasn't seen you, then stop or slow down, you can't argue with a car. Be alert for cars pulling out on you. Many drivers underestimate the speed cyclists can do and think they have time to pull out when in reality an experienced cyclist on a good bike will easily reach speeds of between 20 and thirty miles an hour on city roads and are moving faster than non-cycling drivers realise. Approach every junction with extreme caution even if you have the right of way.

### WHY DO DOGS CHASE CATS AND CATS CHASE DOGS?

**I have a 2 year old chocolate labrador and a year old golden labrador that I've had since they were puppies, before I got them I also had a Tabby cat (who's now 4 years old) and I was just wondering how I can get my dogs and cat to get on because they stop my cat from roaming around the house like she used to be able to and whenever she comes in through the cellar door, she has to run straight up into the attic otherwise the dogs chase her.**

I listened to Cesar Milan recently as he explained about a lady who had just lost her dog. She was upset and decided that she would jump back on the bike and go to the animal shelter and get herself a new dog. She walked past many dogs till she came up to the dog that she knew was for her, a black and tan Rottweiler. She felt so much sadness as she saw the dog cowering in the corner, she knew then that she had found her new pooch. So off they went.

Now picture this, the lady was driving the car with the dog on the back seat and phone in one hand (that's the lady) steering wheel in the other telling all her friends that she had just got a new dog, tears rolling down her face.

As she arrives home somebody wakes up and stretches and looks out of the window. Yep it's a Cat. He jumps down, walks to the door, as he always does, waiting to meet his owner. As the owner opens the door this poor Rottweiler is about to face this bundle of fluff. Within seconds the cat has given this large dog a swipe across the face sending the dog into sheer panic. But the dog didn't run away as you might think he did - something which we can all learn from! He followed the cat around. The cat showed the dog where it could not sit as these areas were his territory; the window-sill, the couch, the bed and so it went on. For the first time the dog had found a strong leader which it could follow. The lady was not in the right state of mind to be a strong pack leader.

So back to this month's question. We all follow rules, we all have boundaries and limitations, and the animal world is no different. They also rely on strong leadership. So start applying these rules. The dogs should have been taught that there are rules. Do not approach the cat, in other words. Should they start to try to play with the cat or worse, then they should be sent to their beds.

Boundaries are simple. If the cat has entered the living room and is happy being around its family and the dogs when they are quiet, then fine. But should they approach the cat at speed or in a manner which worries the cat, then you will need to enforce your leadership and apply the above rule. 'Bed' or any other command like 'sit', or 'down' will hopefully get their attention back on to you and away from the cat. Use treats since labradors love food.

Limitations are that you will not always be there or you may be busy doing something else.
